

 - Self-Examination: Who am I, really?; What do I want/need?; Who do I love? Who do I need to forgive?; How can I be healed?; What are my gifts?; At this point in my life, what should I do with what I have?; How do I cope with struggle?; What will my legacy be?; How can I live more lightly on earth?
 - Goal: To Inspire and Equip Where to Walk, When to Walk, Why to Walk
 - o Pilgrimage: taking the act of slowly moving across a landscape and see it transformed into an embodied spiritual discipline that is rooted in the land.
 - o How can walking connect you to self, others, land?
 - o Pilgrimage: an opportunity to listen to what the land and others are saying
