Welcome Message from the Diversity In Action Committee

Approximately one year ago, our Pastoral Charge voted unanimously to become an Affirming Pastoral Charge. The Affirming Committee, which worked diligently toward this end result, was then dis-banded and a new committee, Diversity In Action, was formed to begin carrying out some of the ideas and suggestions of the Affirming Committee.

The Diversity In Action committee, with members the Reverend Ian Harrison, Glenda MacDonald (Hilden), Jenna Waugh (Old Barns) and Barb Miller (Old Barns), meets every couple of months to discuss ways in which we can open our doors, and our minds and hearts, to reach out to all who may be looking for a spiritual connection, with the invitation that "You are welcome here."

This newsletter will, hopefully, be one of the ways in which we are able to do that. The plan is to produce this Newsletter four times a year. If Rev. lan's usual Seasonal letters at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas coincide with the newsletter, you will receive it then, otherwise, they will be sent to you separately. - Liturgical colour is either violet or blue which represents "Hope"
- Advent candles are usually violet or blue for the first - Hope, second – Peace, and fourth – Love, Sundays with a rose candle being used to celebrate Joy on the third Sunday.

Duke of Edinburgh Award Recipient - Therese McCurdy

On November 2nd, 2015, Therese McCurdy received the Gold Award of Achievement through the Duke of Edinburgh program at a special ceremony held at the Halifax Library, presented by Prince Edward, the Earl of Wessex.

The Duke of Edinburgh award is an International program designed as a personal challenge for person(s) aged 14-24. It is a balanced, non-competitive program of voluntary activities, which encourages personal discovery and growth, self-reliance, perseverance, responsibility, and service to community.

In Canada, the program has been operating since 1963, and Nova Scotia since 1972, with the Governor General as the national chair. Presently, more than 3,500 participants are registered in the province. In the past, Cobequid Educational Centre had a number of students active in the Duke of Edinburgh program, but Therese has been an independent participant in both grade 10 and grade 11.

Participants follow a self-directed program that challenges them to achieve their personal best in four areas:

[Bronze; Silver] physical recreation, community service, skill development, and outdoor expeditions;

[Gold] Previous four, plus a fifth component – a residential project, which is a 5 day, 4-night planned project.

What did Therese do to accomplish this challenge?

- Musical abilities with piano, and violin/fiddle
- Curling, Skiing, Yoga
- ➤ Helped younger students with life skills, teaching Can-Skate, and Drama at the Old Barns United Church
- > Attended SHAD at Carleton University, Ottawa, Ontario
- > Independently kayaking and hiking in Cape Chignecto
- Four-day kayaking and outdoor experiences in Kejimkujik National Park

As I compose this letter, attempting to capture a sentiment and feeling of Christmas, it occurs to me that preparations for the holiday season seem to get underway earlier and earlier every year. We see this in the stores and the malls, where simultaneously as we are observing one occasion, we're reminded to make way for another. It's enough to make any of us feel overloaded, even if we may have decided long ago to reduce the length of our shopping lists and already cramped schedules. Yet when I reflect on what Christmas means for me at its heart, with its virtues of good-will, sharing, generosity, and reaching out to the downtrodden, the world would feel rather empty of meaning and hope if such things were only on our minds and hearts at a certain, scheduled time of year. Many a song and a carol has expressed the wish for that Christmas feeling and all its hallmarks to be part of us and the way we live all the time. If Christmas itself feels like a sudden inconvenience, something to get through rather than embrace, maybe there remains something in the story of the Christ child yet to transform us, something wondrous we have not yet heard, something mysterious that has not yet enthralled us, something incredible that can have the power to stay with us during the in-between times as well as the moments of celebration.
